







GREENHOUSE GAS EMISSIONS CALCUATION 2035

Job Creation & Economic Engine




Connect SoCal will create 168,400 jobs annually through transportation system investments, as well as 264,500 jobs annually due to enhanced economic competitiveness and improved overall regional economic performance.

- Construction ranks #4 out of 20 industries for anticipated job growth over 2016-2045 (+30.6%)
- Present-day average wage of \$63,674.











After the Pandemic: SCAG Region's Employment Plunged, Unemployment Rate Skyrocketed

SCAG Region and U.S. (2019-2020)



Lowest wage sectors accounted for over 60% of decrease in employment.

High Uncertainty in Retail Trade and Taxable Sales




- Initial regional forecast (4/28) estimate was high for 2020, 2021.
- Initially viewed as highly pessimistic
- April retail trade data in line with overall asserted inputs
- Economic re-opening in May led to relative improvement earlier than our timeline
- Recent resurgence of virus suggests an uneven road ahead


Uncertainties:

- Public health trajectory (treatments, vaccine)
- Return of shutdowns
- Additional government spending will backfill some of the losses
- Assumes steady recovery with supply-demand equilibrium throughout







Community Impact Assessment



- Poorer jurisdictions most vulnerable
- Higher Rates of:
 - Essential Workers
 - Household overcrowding
 - Disadvantaged Communities
- Environmental Justice Areas account for 65% of Region



Community Impact Assessment



- In the Coachella Valley Association of Governments (CVAG) region
 - About 90% of jurisdictions (10) rely on >= 20% of tax revenues from sales and use, and transient occupancy tax
 - About 65% of jurisdictions (7) rely on >= 20% of tax revenues from sales and use tax
 - About 45% of jurisdictions (5) rely on >= 20% of tax revenues from transient occupancy tax

Community Impact Assessment

SCAG...

- In the Coachella Valley Association of Governments (CVAG) region
 - Seniors account for nearly 20% of the population
 - Residents without health insurance account for more than 10% of the population
 - Nearly 60% of population is minority
 - Households below federal poverty level account for roughly 13%



Uneven Decline and Recovery – Riverside County





In addition to the hardest hit by pandemic, many of jobs at low wage levels are facing risk of a slower, more drawn-out recovery



Riverside County & San Bernardino County







- Unemployment was at an historic low in 2019, then was hit by the pandemic.
- Major Issues
 - Tourism-related sectors were the hardest hit and will still be lagging pre-pandemic highs well after 2021.
 - Growth in high growth sectors such as Logistics, Construction, and Healthcare has been revised down.
 - The considerable job losses experienced in the region could work to slow its population growth and subsequent recovery.
